

## **Public Health Orders and Churches**

The following is the guidance most directly relevant to churches.

### **Confirmed Cases and Close Contacts**

Individuals identified as having COVID-19 or a close contact of someone with COVID-19 must immediately enter mandatory isolation/self-isolation (quarantine) until public health officials advise they can end isolation/self-isolation (quarantine).

Household members or close contacts of a person or persons with COVID-19 must immediately go into mandatory self-isolation (quarantine) for 14 days from the last date of exposure and call Health Links--Info Santé (204-788-8200 or 1-888-315-9257) if they develop symptoms.

### **Gatherings**

Households can choose one of the following:

- designating two visitors to their home; or
- designating a second household so that the two households can visit each other, as long as everyone in the house has authorized those designated individuals to visit.

Outdoor visits of up to 10 people only plus members of a household on an outdoor private property.

Current orders prohibit gatherings of more than 25 people at an outdoor place or more than five people at an indoor public place or the common areas of a multi-unit residence..

Drive-in events are restricted to household members only, and people may leave their vehicle while observing public health measures.

Funerals can have 25 people in addition to the officiant under clear COVID-19 protection protocols.

Weddings can have up to 25 people in addition to the officiant and a photographer or videographer.

Self-help groups for persons dealing with addictions or other behaviours can hold meetings at 25 per cent capacity of the premise where meetings take place.

Outdoor physical activities for individuals and immediate households are allowed. However, those participating in outdoor sports or recreational activities must maintain a separation of at least two metres from each other, unless they reside in the same household. Groups of more than 25 cannot gather in an outdoor public space.

### **Worship Services**

Places of worship can hold regular religious services if a service does not exceed 25 per cent of usual capacity or 100 people, whichever is lower.

Persons attending a religious service at a place of worship must wear a mask at all times when they are in the place of worship.

Masks may only be taken off while household groups are seated at a service, are appropriately distanced from other groups, and are not singing.

## **Masks**

A person who enters or remains in an indoor public place must wear a mask in a manner that covers their mouth, nose and chin without gapping.

The operator of an indoor public place must ensure that every person who is not wearing a mask while in the indoor public place is given a reminder to do so as soon as possible following entry.

Masks are not required if people are seated at least two metres from others, or if there is a non-permeable physical barrier, such as a plexiglass barrier. However, people need to wear a mask at all times while moving to or from their seated position within the indoor public place.

In addition, employees, contractors or operators of an indoor public place do not need to wear a mask while they are in an area where members of the public do not normally have access, or if they are behind a non-permeable physical barrier, including a plexiglass barrier.

People can temporarily remove their mask while in an indoor public place:

- to receive a service that requires the removal of their mask,
- to deal with an emergency or medical purpose,
- to establish their identity, or
- while household groups are seated at a religious gathering service, are appropriately distanced from other groups, and are not singing.

People who do not have to wear masks include:

- a child who is under five years of age;
- a person with a medical condition that is unrelated to COVID-19, including breathing or cognitive difficulties or a disability, which prevents them from safely wearing a mask; and
- a person who is unable to put on or remove a mask without the assistance of another person.

## **Additional Information**

In addition to these orders, Michael Pahl met with other faith leaders in a roundtable with Dr. Brent Roussin, Manitoba's Chief Public Health Officer, on March 11, 2021. In this meeting the following was clarified, and still apply:

- 1) **Sunday schools** may operate according to the protocols for "Day camps" (order 11); that is:
  - a. occupancy in all areas used by campers is restricted to 25% of the usual capacity of those areas;
  - b. the maximum size of a group of campers is 25 and no joint activities between groups take place; and
  - c. campers bring their own food and beverages or all food and beverages served at the camp are individually packaged.
- 2) **Church committees** are subject to gathering restrictions: 5 persons indoors, 25 outdoors.
- 3) All **singers** are to remain masked, including anyone leading from the front.
