
2020-2022 will be remembered as the years where most meetings took place on Zoom (online web conferencing platform) due to the Covid-19 global pandemic.

From the Moderator

We declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. (1 John 1:3)

The congregation is the foundational unit of the church. This affirmation was a crucial element of the new structure adopted by Mennonite Church Canada and the five Regional Churches in 2017. This affirmation does not diminish the recognition that the church is much larger than the local congregation, and indeed, encompasses the body of Christ worldwide. Conferences like Mennonite Church Manitoba remain an important way for local congregations to connect with each other and the larger church, and to work at missional initiatives too large for one congregation. Nevertheless, mission begins with the local congregation. This is where people worship together, celebrate the Lord's Supper together, support each other, and discern how to reach out to their communities in mission.

The past two years of pandemic have severely impacted how people in local congregations relate to each other and witness beyond themselves. The MCM Board devoted a block of time at its retreat in September, 2021 to reflect on this reality. We were convinced a renewed focus on the local congregation was needed. We thus agreed to launch a 2-year intensive initiative on congregational health, with the first year highlighting congregational and pastoral care and local witness. To give this initiative concrete expression the Board formed a **Congregational Health Committee** to lead this initiative, and gave Kathy Giesbrecht the new role of **Director of Congregational Ministries**. We are also in the midst of a search to replace Rick Neufeld as **Director of Leadership Ministries**.

Congregational health begins with what happens within the congregation, but it cannot stay there. A flourishing congregation naturally and inevitably plays a life-giving role in its immediate community. The MCM Board has also taken some actions to encourage how congregations reach out beyond themselves. There are now four working groups in MCM set up to support the church's mission, one bringing together women in MCM (Woven), one on Palestine-Israel, one on Indigenous Solidarity, and one still in formation on Climate Action. Each works with larger Canadian initiatives in those areas, and each is available to resource and assist congregations in their own thinking and witness. We have also established a position in Mission Engagement which Melanie Neufeld will fill on March 1. In this role she will work at resource development for the larger church, but she also has the mandate

to work with local congregations in discerning how they might look beyond themselves, in their local communities but also through International Witness, an important outreach program we do together with the other Regional Churches as Mennonite Church Canada. Despite the pandemic having severely restricted what our **Camps with Meaning** program could do during these past two years, it remains a key program of MCM, both for resourcing the local congregation and for reaching out beyond ourselves.

Working together in this way is only possible through the generosity of the MCM congregations and members. When we presented our financial statements a year ago, along with financial projections for 2021, we were very concerned. Indeed, we presented a budget with a significant deficit, due largely to an anticipated shortfall in the camping program finances. We are so pleased to report that this did not happen. Generous designated donations to Camps with Meaning, along with grants from government and the Winnipeg Foundation, resulted in us ending 2021 in the black (see financial reports for more details). For this we thank you, the God whom we serve, and a dedicated and knowledgeable staff with Michael Pahl as Executive Minister. We now look forward to a 2022 which we pray will be more normal, one in which MCM congregations will grow as "communities of grace, joy and peace so that God's healing and hope flow through us to the world." (taken from the Mennonite Church Canada Vision Statement).

Executive Minister's Report

In 1 John 1:3, the author speaks of our *koinonia*—our "fellowship," or, as our theme puts it, our "shared life." *Koinonia* is about holding the most important things in common—the good news of Jesus, our relationship with God, our life in the Spirit. It's about sharing in worship, sharing broken bread around open tables, sharing gifts and resources, sharing in service for the good of each other, the good of all.

In my first year as Executive Minister, I have experienced this "shared life" among us as Mennonite Church Manitoba. I work with a talented and committed group of staff who seek to support our congregations and guide our regional ministries. I serve alongside a dedicated Board and MCM committees who bring their gifts from each of their congregations to serve the wider church. I have had the joy of connecting with all of our active pastors in one way or another, seeing their dedication to their ministry and their care for our congregations. I have had the privilege of visiting nearly 20 of our congregations to share in worship, to share in resourcing, to share what God is doing among us. I have experienced our shared life together in the ministry of our Faith and Life Choirs even during a pandemic, and in the faithful service of two colleagues who will be leaving us this year: Rick Neufeld and David Hogue.

I have also experienced this **"shared life" with our wider church body**, both nationwide as Mennonite Church Canada and beyond our borders with other national churches and organizations. It is an honour to work with my Executive Minister colleagues across our five regional churches, collaborating together with MC Canada EM Doug Klassen and the MC Canada Joint Council to carry out our shared ministry as congregations across Canada and around the world.

All this "shared life," and the work that is a part of it, is reflected in this report book. Let me highlight a few areas of special attention for me in my role as Executive Minister.

During 2021 we put some energy into **re-focusing our major program areas**. This was not a planned review; rather it was prompted by changing circumstances. Nevertheless, I am pleased with where this has led us. We now have four main program areas:

- Leadership Ministries, focused on supporting our spiritual leaders and particularly our pastors;
- Congregational Ministries, focused on supporting the internal life of our congregations (worship, faith formation, care ministries, and so on);

- Mission Ministries, focused on supporting the external ministries of our congregations, especially locally but also beyond their communities; and
- Camps with Meaning, our shared camping and retreat ministries.

Related to this are some shifts in staff positions. Rick Neufeld remains as Director of Leadership Ministries, though his impending retirement will bring a new person into this role. Kathy Giesbrecht is now the Director of Congregational Ministries, and Dorothy Fontaine is the Director of Camps with Meaning. We will welcome Melanie Neufeld into the Director of Mission Engagement role as of March 1.

Our MCM website has undergone some changes, in part to better reflect this program re-focusing and to clarify contacts and provide resourcing in these program areas. If you are ever in doubt about who to contact about what, though, just contact any of us and we will get you to the right people for your question!

Complementing this re-focusing of our major program areas has been a renewal of MCM committees and working groups. This is part of an initiative to do the work of the regional church together-neither simply paid staff nor entirely relying on volunteers, but intentionally bringing staff and congregation members together to do the work of the church. As the Ministerial Leadership Committee supports the work of the Director of Leadership Ministries in supporting pastors and other spiritual leaders among us, so the new Congregational Health Committee works with the Director of Congregational Ministries to support congregations toward their flourishing. A new working group has been formed in partnership with MCC Manitoba-the Manitoba Mennonite Coalition for Indigenous Solidarity-to help resource and mobilize congregations for this important work. A similar working group is forming related to climate action.

In 2021 we returned to the calls of previous years to listen to one another around LGBTQ+ recognition and inclusion. I met with our pastors in spring 2021, meetings which included hearing from them regarding where our congregations were at in this matter. This prepared the way for a "listening circle" in October, where MCM congregations were invited to send two representatives to share their congregation's discernment over the past few years around this matter. A listening committee attended that circle and produced a report and recommendations to the Board. These were received and approved by the Board, and the report will be available for delegates at our Gathering.

Another area of attention was our **regional church finances**. A Finance Committee was established to provide support for the Board and me as we oversee and make decisions related to financial matters. One key recommendation, approved by the Board, was to streamline existing funds and accounts—including several which had been inactive for years—and move our reserve and capital funds to Abundance to gain a greater return on these larger, longer-term funds.

We also spent some time **clarifying our relationships with our member congregations**. Sadly, we determined in this process that Iglesia Jesús es el Camino is no longer operating. A current list of full and affiliate member congregations can be found in this year's report book. I encourage congregations to submit current constitutions and report books to our office. This is not a requirement of MCM membership, but it does help us understand the unique dynamics of each congregation so that we can serve you better.

This is our desire as MCM staff: to facilitate our "shared life" together, our *koinonia* as a regional church body. We are here to serve you, our member congregations, to help us hold the most important things in common as a regional and nationwide church—the good news of Jesus, our relationship with God, our life in the Spirit. May we continue sharing together in worship, sharing broken bread together around open tables, sharing gifts and resources together, sharing together in service for the good of each other and the good of all.

Camps with Meaning

The theme for our 2022 Annual Gathering, "Shared Life: Together with God," is based on 1 John 1:3. In this passage, the writer makes an insightful connection between sharing what we witness through the life, teachings, and on-going presence of Jesus, to the strength of our "shared life" together with God.

At Camps with Meaning, bearing witness to the gospel and the on-going work of the Spirit occurs frequently and naturally. Campers share their experiences of Christ throughout the day; be it around a campfire, a conversation along forest trails, Bible lessons and devotions, worship, or the music that we write and sing together. This, in large part, is why camp has been formative for generation after generation of campers. Camp is where the gospel of Christ and our encounters with Him come together. In the sharing of these experiences, strong hope-filled communities are born, the "church" is born, and faith comes alive!

Over the last two years, the pandemic has, without question, changed our programs in both scope and size, but it hasn't changed our encounters and experiences of Christ. For this, we are grateful and encouraged. No matter the circumstance, the Spirit continues to move amongst us, nurturing our shared life together, connecting in and through Christ with all our relations.

Impact of COVID 19

While restrictions eased in many industry sectors, they did not change, at least in any measurable way, for the Manitoba camping industry. As a result, our capacity sizes were significantly smaller in 2021. Specifically, the summer camp program operated at approximately 25% of normal capacity, our Leadership Training program at 50% capacity, and our guest rental program at less than 15% capacity. This not only presents financial challenges for us, but as the pandemic draws out, it increasingly impacts the relationships that we have with campers, staff (summer and year-round), volunteers, and guests. This is significant, because Camps with Meaning is founded on relationships. Many of our staff and volunteers were once campers, then counselors, then leadership staff, then volunteers. Maintaining and reestablishing those relationships is therefore key moving forward. Our staff are working hard to connect in various ways with existing guest groups, summer staff, campers and volunteers.

One of the most remarkable stories of 2021 relates to the financial support that we have received. Last year, we projected that Camps with Meaning would have a financial loss of between \$30,000 - \$100,000 but it appears that we will have a small surplus! This, in large part, is due to three things:

- The generosity of donors who gave consistently and generously throughout the year and to a new fundraising campaign, Ring up the Cash, that we launched in the spring of 2021.
- We received two significant grants amounting to \$60,000 through The Winnipeg Foundation.
- The wage subsidy program through the Government of Canada.

We are also encouraged by the large number of guest groups who continue to express interest in returning to camp once restrictions allow them to, and the strong showing of volunteers who have so generously donated their time throughout the year when restrictions allowed.

Recovery Plan & Capital Campaign

In anticipating that the pandemic will shift to being endemic in 2022, we have developed, and hope to implement, a recovery plan. The plan is two-fold, focusing on:

- Strengthening and rebuilding relationships with campers, staff, and guests, and connecting with new campers and staff through events, a new marketing and engagement plan, and new marketing materials.
- Moving forward with our capital campaign, which was originally set to launch in the spring of 2020 but was postponed due to the pandemic.

The capital campaign, which was approved at the AGM in 2020, is a key part of the on-going strategic plan and vision for Camps with Meaning that was first introduced in 2015. Although minor changes to the plans are forthcoming as we take into consideration the impacts of the pandemic, the key projects will remain the same. The development plans will not only allow us to move ahead with new year-round programs for Camps with Meaning but they will likely generate an annual revenue surplus of over \$90,000 after the direct cost of additional staffing and operations are taken into account. In the coming months, the Fundraising Team and Camp Committee will be fine-tuning capital campaign plans. We look forward to sharing more information with you as these plans are finalized.

Camp Koinonia

Camp Koinonia like all organizations was great affected by the pandemic throughout 2021. We have mostly operated at either capacity limits or vaccinated only status. While some groups appreciated this government requirement others were required to cancel their bookings. The Main lodge has been very slow compared to pre pandemic occupancy rates, while the Mini Lodge has continued to be very busy.

Some of the highlights of 2021 for was the completion of the Main Lodge basement, this cozy in the winter and cool in the summer space will be a great addition for all to enjoy. We also received a Hometown Greenteam grant to hire summer help from May-September, we thank Brianna Wiebe for taking on that position and for all the work that she did this past summer. Camp Koinonia was also granted a Building Sustainable Communities grant this year, this was for a safety and accessibility upgrade grant. With this 50/50 grant from the province, we were able to install a new fire alarm system, upgrade all emergency lightening to LED and install 3 new exit doors in the main lodge. We are very happy to say that the main doors of the lodge are now handicapped accessible.

Camp Koinonia was thrilled to host Camps with Meaning for a week of day camps in July and look forward to working with Camps with Meaning again 2022.

Thanks in huge part to our volunteers over the past year we were able to accomplish many things, including 21 people helping out with our woodcutters retreat in October, all of your help does not go unnoticed. Thank you also to Evan Laramee and Meara Sparling for all their hard work maintaining the camp, the place has never looked better!







Our Pop-up camps ran for one day in locations around the province, in Morden, Steinbach, Winnipeg and at Assiniboia. The day included 2 Bible lessons, crafts, activities and games. We are very grateful to the churches who hosted us -Morden Mennonite, Grace Mennonite, and Bethel Mennonite. These were again a valuable and meaningful way to connect with our supporting churches.

We had a total of 50 campers attend a Pop-Up Camp – a smaller number than last year, but there were more options out there, and our day camps were a stronger draw as well. We also hosted 149 campers at 4 weeks of day camp at Camp Assiniboia and 30 at our Koinonia week. Full days

looked very uncertain this spring. We were, however, able to sing together - spaced out and masked and outdoors - which was a true blessing for our campers and staff! This next summer's overarching theme is "Discipleship." As in other years, we will pull together past Bible Instructors, pastors and teachers to give direction

were planned and we were able to include all of our activities again this summer - with campers and staff wearing masks at the ropes course, and opportunities to swim at both sites as well.

We were able to connect with almost 250 campers, although we really did miss the rhythm and space of the overnight program. The long, jam-packed days felt more exhausting, even with evenings to relax a little -

This summer was again much different from the normal routine. We were able to offer three one-day Pop-up camps for our ADV campers in July - only a few campers took advantage, but those that came had a great time worshipdistancing protocols added to the drain on staff energy as well. A regular summer is being planned for 2022, recognizing that we do not know where the pandemic will be at or what restrictions will be required. All is still held loosely, but with a good dose of hope!

Our two camps continue to work toward the future. Koinonia hosted 21 people at its fall Woodcutters' Retreat, and continues to upgrade the facilities. New emergency exit doors are on their way to being installed. Evan and Meara continue to live on-site, taking care of the facilities and guest groups. Assiniboia has completed renovations to the Mini-Conference Centre, and has hired Lauren Gervais as Food Service Coordinator. Plans are in the works to move the ropes course inside the levee, and to add change houses and storage to the lake area.

Retreats

Retreats were also more difficult to run during this past year, but we were able to run our annual ADV Winter Retreat in February at Camp Assiniboia. Natasha Neustaedter Barg and Claudia Dueck provided leadership and many of our senior summer staff volunteered to make this a meaningful time for the 16 participants.

By May, the restrictions in place forced us to cancel our Birding Retreat. Our "Fall" Staff Retreat shifted to a oneday event on November 27 – many of our summer staff took advantage of the beautiful winter day. Skiing, sledding and sticks in the snow, as well as games and puzzles and worship inside made for a great fellowship event.

At this point we foresee not being able to run the ADV retreat this February, but are hopeful that other retreats might be possible in May and in the fall. Plans for the Birding Retreat have begun.

The 16 volunteers were mostly Health Officers and Camp Pastors, with minimal kitchen staff needed. We are especially grateful for the Health Officers who made all of our programs possible, but also very appreciative of the support of our camp pastors.

We had a lovely group of 7 Teen Volunteers who helped out in all sorts of roles and got their feet wet as staff for the first time. Our SLT group was made up of 17 great young staff, many of whom had been part of our large TV group in 2019. We were so thankful to be able to run training weeks and our out-trip program, although modified, for our SLTs this year. While our returning staff were a small bunch this summer, mostly due to the uncertainties around the summer possibilities, they were a solid and creative group who stepped up into all sorts of new things with energy and joy.

The program had a smaller group of 9 strong leaders this summer. We had a mix of returning and new leadership staff, but with the changes to the program we all felt new much of the time! Their patience and creativity and passion for the camping ministry were inspirational.

COMMUNITY OF SPIRITUAL LEADERSHIP (COSL)

This year MC Canada drew together a Nation-wide group of people from its regional partners. MCM's representatives were Virginia Gerbrandt-Richert and Rick Neufeld (Regional Church Minister). The purpose is outlined:

Purpose: The Community of Spiritual Leadership

(COSL) would act as a coordinating body focused on the following tasks within the MC Canada Nationwide Community of Faith:

- 1. Assist in nurturing a strong Anabaptist identity
- 2. Discern together on issues facing the church ("attend to matters of shared concern") including visioning, study, and input for nationwide discernment
- 3. Mutual encouragement and support for spiritual leaders, including prayer, fellowship and networking
- 4. Broad-level engagement with issues of leadership development including:
 - a. mentoring of current and emerging leaders
 - b. initiation of programs to call new pastors and leaders
 - c. coordination of leadership training programs and studies
- 5. Nationwide consideration of issues related to credentialing and mutual accountability
 - a. attend to principles surrounding the covenantal relationship between congregations and leaders
 - b. develop policies, procedures, and resources related to leadership, credentialing, and discipline
 - c. develop competencies for leaders and congregations

MCM invited a number of local leaders to imagine what the implementation of this vision within MCM could entail. The group has met several times and continues to explore ways of fulfilling its purpose. More updates will be coming shortly. I wish to thank this group of passionate leaders for their willingness to engage in this way. They are: Virginia Gerbrandt-Richert, Laura Funk, Laverne Siemens, Nadya Langelotz, Lee Hiebert and Rick Neufeld.

Through the Leadership Ministries, MCM is privileged to administer a number of financial bursaries to pastors and church leaders for the primary purpose of continued pastoral education and missional training. We are tremendously grateful for two long-standing funds that provide financial assistance on a yearly basis. This year, the A.G Neufeld and Jake & Dorothy Pauls Bursary Funds gave financial support to Norm Voth and Ben Pauls who received training in the area of Transitional Ministry for congregations. We give thanks for the investment that continues to benefit the church today and for the future. This is my final report as Director of Leadership Ministries. In 2021 our shared life in the Spirit expressed itself in a multitude of ways.

BRIGHT LIGHTS OF 2021

1) YMF Circle (including: Youth/Youth Adult/Family/Faith Formation pastors) was alive and well. This Circle of pastors met 2-4 times a month online for: spiritual practice (Awareness Examen), support, conversations about challenges and opportunities, resourcing, collaboration and celebration. We also were able to squeeze in a Day Retreat at Camp Assiniboia as part of our Sept. initiative: walking forward in Prayer. Together we have shared life: laughter, tears, silence, strong words of encouragement and hope. It is my absolute privilege to accompany these pastors on

their ministry journeys. Within this Circle we celebrated two Ordinations: Erika Enns Rodine (FMC) and Andrea De Avila (SAMC)...a Licensing: Josh Janzen (ABC) and a calling to ministry: Tobian Penner (SHMC); Taysa Dueck Commissioned for Lay Ministry (FGMF). Future looking Bright!

2) MCM Youth Lent Worship Services. Gathering each Sunday evening during Lent, we worshipped together from the various corners of MCM. Each week featured contributions from youth and pastors and each week I was awed by the gifts that were shared. The participants of this Lent Worship time also responded to a need for School Kits, we were made aware of by an MCC guest, and together raised over \$2,000. 3)Healthy Masculinity Curriculum. This project is a collaboration with MCC MB, CMU and MCM in response to a need we sensed within our community. How do we offer our young men and women a different perspective from the ones that bombard

them from the media waters they swim in? Creating this curriculum is one response. Moses Falco and I were both

part of the development team and MCM also offered our gift of video creation. Darryl Neustaedter Barg is currently working on this as the final phase in the development of this congregational resource.

> 4) Woven: Mennonite Women Together experimented with providing Zoom Room space for shared learning and conversation. (see Woven Report). A highlight for me was participating in this experiment by hosting a number of the Woven Wednesdays.

5) Manitoba Partnerships. We continue to be strong supporters of the Menno Office on the campus of the University of Manitoba. Chaplain Mark Von Kampen, despite all the waves in 2021, continues to reach out and care for students who connect with

this ministry. We give thanks to God for him. I, along with a number of MCM pastors continued to connect with and support MCI, Westgate and CMU. I personally was able to make visits to both MCI and Westgate at the beginning of the School Year.

6) National Partnership. MCM has been a strong and initiating partner within Mennonite Church Canada for National Youth and Young Adult ministry. Jeff Friesen is our regional representative on the Amplfy! (National Youth

Gathering Aug. 2022) Planning Group. I have been active in working toward a Young Leaders Experience in Edmonton at the National Gathering in July. We are working toward offering an integrated, accompanied experience for young leaders from across the nation wide Church.

7) International Partnership. The MCM Indonesia 2022 group came into being in response to the invitation from Mennonite World Conference to gather in Indonesia. This group of 5, coordinated by Andrea De Aliva, along with our Regional Rep. An-

Forest, planned by YMF Climate Action sub group. A number of MCM youth groups/youth will travel together to Amplfy!, the National Youth Gathering at Camp Valaqua in August.

Then Came the Shift.....I transitioned from Assoc. Director of Leadership Ministries to Director of Congregational Ministries.

Over the last decade the scope of my work has continued to expand in response to the changing needs of our

congregations. Requests for resourcing, consulting and support for a variety of congregational ministries reflected the emerging realities and a desire to respond in faithfulness to the new and sometimes challenging days they found themselves in.

The creation of the role of Director of Congregational Ministries is an MCM Board response to provide the support our congregations are expressing a need for. In the Fall, I worked with Don Rempel Boschman (MCM Board Member) to put together a Congregational Health Committee (that he will chair) to guide and support this new ministry. The members include: Bruno Dyck, Mark Tiessen Dyck, Lisa Enns, and Dori Zerbe Cornelson. The priorities set for this ministry in 2022/23 are strengthening the congregational ministries of: Pastoral/Congregational Care and Community Ministry. The first initiative in this direction is the Mar. 5 Afternoon of Equipping, focused on Congregational Care.





Working Groups

Palestine-Israel Network

The Mennonite Church Manitoba Palestine-Israel Network (MCMPIN) remains a part of the larger Mennonite Church Canada Palestine-Israel Network (MC Canada PIN) which came together after the July 2016 MC Canada assembly passed its resolution on Palestine and Israel. Within this past year, the MCMPIN (formerly named "working group") continued to meet monthly to pray, educate each other and the wider constituency, and advocate for peace, justice and human rights for all living in 'the Holy Land.'

During this year, the 13 active members of the MCMPIN engaged and supported the following education and advocacy initiatives:

- The monthly UPDATE sent out on behalf of MCCPIN. This update included accurate current information on the situation for Palestinians in the West Bank including East Jerusalem, Gaza and within Israel; information on the monthly "Write a Letter" advocacy letter provided by our group (see next item); news from MCCPIN partner Bethlehem Bible College; updates and prayer requests from Canadian Friends of Sabeel (CFOS); items related to Canada's position on Palestine-Israel; and much more. (To view the current Update go to https://mailchi.mp/646a2cbae892/sumud-steadfastpersistence?e=60983d4cd7. To subscribe, use the "subscribe" button.)
- Monthly Write a Letter Wednesday--virtual gatherings to write letters to Canadian government officials or business executives. Some advocacy themes were: e-Parliamentary petitions promoting Palestinian rights; children in Israeli military detention; lifting the blockade on Gaza; stopping the evictions of Palestinians in East Jerusalem; concerns about the linking of Palestinian advocacy with antisemitism; harms caused by business enterprises in the occupied West Bank; and peaceful Olive Harvest;
- MCM's website included working group updates and announcements at https://mennochurch.mb.ca/ get-involved/Israel-Palestine
- On June 2, MCMPIN worked with Gaser- a Palestinian and Israel dialogue group, Friends of Rotary and MCC to host a conversation on the Farah Nabulsi's film, The Present. The film tells the story of difficulties encountered by a father and daughter while traveling in the West Bank, due to the Israeli check point system. Attendance reached 45 people.
- The fall (Sept. 18 & Oct. 2nd) held as promoted,

a two-part webinar series on Christian Zionism: "Whose Land? Whose Promise?" Speakers included Rev. Alex Awad, Rev. Carrie Ballenger (in Jerusalem) Professor Ron Dart and Dr. Dan Epp-Tiessen (CMU) Attendance reached close to 75 participants.

- MCMPIN participated in the ecumenical Canada Stand Up for Palestinian Children's Rights (CSUF-PCR) campaign: We appointed a representative on the planning committee. Several of us met with MP Leah Gazan to encourage her to support and sign on to a letter urging the Canadian government to appoint a Special Envoy in Palestine to monitor the treatment of Palestinian children in military detention. And many of us took part in an outdoor public witness on Nov. 28th on Portage Avenue, with a turnout of 75 supporters, including those from the Palestinian and Jewish communities. This event was captured by both the Free Press and CBC in news releases with favorable commentary on the mission of the event.
- We endorsed and promoted a number of online events sponsored by fellow advocacy groups. One highlight was the Canadian Friends of Sabeel (CFOS) James Graff Memorial Lecture entitled From Turtle Island to Palestine, on Dec. 2nd. It featured Dr, Rashid Khalidi, author of A Hundred Years War on Palestine: A History of Settler -Colonialism and Resistance, and Alma Brooks, Maleseet grandmother and Indigenous elder.
- Our PIN continues to collaborate with other advocacy groups through on-line meetings, promotion of webinars, and joint meetings with Manitoba MPs. They include Independent Jewish Voices, United Network for a Just Peace in Palestine and Israel (United Church), Mennonite Central Committee, Canadian Friends of Sabeel, local Palestinian associations and others devoted to justice and peace in the Middle East.

In the spirit of Mennonite Church Canada's Resolution on Palestine and Israel, we continue the work of listening and learning, educating and advocating for just peace. Palestinian Christians urge us as brothers and sisters to speak truth to power, with humility but also with boldness in the fervent hope that Israel's 54 year military occupation will end, and everyone living in the land called Palestine and Israel will experience a true and lasting peace.

We invite interested women from the MCM community to come and add their perspectives and energy to our shared vision and work.

This year, we accomplished several tasks, in addition to enjoying each other.

1. Funding matters: We completed the Anabaptist Women in Leadership Bursary so CMU can offer it to suitable applicants. Unfortunately, no suitable person applied this year.

We also committed to pay a portion for the MCM young adults who will be going to Indonesia.

2. We clarified our purpose statement so that it now reads: WOVEN is a community of Mennonite Women, primarily within Mennonite Church Manitoba who,

- a. Listen to the voices and experiences of women
- b. Respond by providing resources for women, through networks of support and idea sharing
- c. Stand in solidarity with Anabaptist Women around the world by providing support and leadership development opportunities

Led by Kathy Giesbrecht and Tina Fehr Kehler, our presenting guests were artists, Margie Hildebrand and Marika Veith who spoke on the relationships between Faith and Art, the Spiritual Director, Lilly Williams, who introduced Mandalas as a spiritual practise, seasoned guides in living through change, Elsie Rempel and Char Epp on the "Merry Maze of Christmas," Finally, our mystic journal keeper, Tina Fehr Kehler, helped us close out the year with "Past (pause), Present (pause), Future (pause)".

• the first issue of a Newsletter: Weaving Women's

Words, came out in December of 2021, thanks to the fine editorial work of Heather Hildebrand.

• a statement to welcome gender diverse participation was developed, even while retaining our focus on "women's issues."

• planning to offer a spring retreat on Mental Health, til Omicron reared its nasty crown. At this point we hope to gather women for fellowship and to watch an MWC workshop by Anabaptist Women Theologians together next July. Stay tuned.

4. We did some cleaning at a women's shelter in Winkler, in solidarity with the Jewish community for their November Mitzvah(social action)Day. This was well received and reported on in the Free Press.

Manitoba Mennonite Coalition for Indigenous Solidarity

The (Manitoba) Mennonite Coalition for Indigenous Solidarity (MCIS) is a coalition of Manitoba Mennonites committed to the spiritual and practical work of solidarity with Indigenous peoples. The group was formed following the recommendations of an interim advisory group. The MCIS group then began meeting in October 2021 and consists of a dozen members from both rural and urban communities. We recognize that Mennonites have been committed to Indigenous-Settler engagement in a diversity of ways for many years, both under the auspices of Mennonite institutions and on their own accord. The MCIS is rooted in the conviction that we can do even greater work when we come together and organize with intentionality. To that end, the MCIS has been established as a mutual partnership between Mennonite Church Manitoba (MCM) and Mennonite Central Committee Manitoba (MCCM) in order to add collective strength and accountability to the work of these respective institutions.

The Mennonite Coalition for Indigenous Solidarity (MCIS) was formed in response to invitations from Indigenous peoples and communities. Indigenous peoples have been calling all sectors of Canadian society to take concerted, organized action toward reconciliation and right relations. These calls are apparent in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, the Final Report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, and the ongoing invitations from local partners and Indigenous nations across Turtle Island. Many of these calls for reparation are specifically addressed to the Church.

The MCIS believes that the work of reconciliation is integral to our Christian faith as Anabaptists. The MCIS draws strength and inspiration from Scripture and from Creator's desire for a reconciled world. For this reason, the MCIS is committed to responding faithfully to Indigenous invitations to faith communities. The MCIS also aims to breathe life into the resolutions that our Mennonite institutions have already passed.

The MCIS will engage with Mennonites across the diversity of our congregations to mobilize for collective action. This includes empowering our respective constituencies through education and dialogue that centers the priorities of Indigenous peoples. The MCIS will also resource churches with practical opportunities to engage the work of Indigenous solidarity and be a receptacle for learnings, ideas, and initiatives that arise from within congregations. MCIS will play this facilitating role in order to build momentum around Indigenous justice concerns, strengthen capacity for church engagement, and encourage bold and collaborative action within the constituency.

 - Covid 19 has made everything unpredictable but God has provided.
 - Overview given of categories of Revenue and Expenses and how the Bottom line (revenues minus expenses) should be close to zero.
 - All Financial reports and Budgets in Report Book Addendum.
- 2020 Finance Report:
 - Individual and congregational giving lower than budgeted.
 - MC Canada support lower reflects an agreement to credit this amount back to MCM for previous over-payment.
 - Expenses minimized due to lack of travel and no EM for six months.
 - Government grant obtained to cover the amount of Camps with Meaning deficit.
 - Bottom line- due to hard work by staff and grants has resulted in a substantial surplus.
- 2021 Camps Projections (not a budget)- two scenarios for how 2021 could play out
 - Scenario 1- worst case scenario- minimal rentals and staff layoffs; Scenario 2 full rentals and all staff return September 1. Both are assuming no overnight camps.
 - In either scenario expenses will be greater than revenue and will result in significant deficit.
 - Strategies to dealing with deficit will include making constant adjustments, minimizing expenses, fundraising and applying for grants.
- Camps with Meaning has been successful in their application for a Winnipeg Foundation grant.
- MCM 2021 Budget
 - To deal with Camps deficit, support for MC Canada will be less and support for Camps will be increased just for 2021. Part of this extra support to Camps will help with transition staffing needs.
 - Bottom line of 2021 budget takes into account Camps deficit of Scenario 1. With 2020 surplus, budget is balanced.
- Responses to Reports:
 - Notes in chat expressing appreciation for Michael's reports and clear presentation.
 - Wes Sawatsky (Seeds): Commended Michael on his presentation. It would be nice to have year-to-year com-

parison in Statement of Equity. Question- what is Capital Asset Impairment (CK) on p 4 of 2020 Financial Statements?

- « Response Richard Klassen: Likely a liability on one of assets, maybe Koinonia.
- « Response—Michael Pahl: will clarify and those who want this clarification can email him directly.
- < Response Richard Klassen: The reviewed financial statements presented to the Board did have the equity comparison.
- Response Marvin Lesser (Emmanuel): capital asset impairment means something that is in need of repair in order for it to be useable. Camp Koinonia has been working on renovating their basement and it could be related to that.
- Moses Falco (Sterling): How might the reduced contribution to MC Canada affect nation-wide ministry? What are other regions doing? What will 2022 numbers look like?
 - Response—Michael Pahl: ESG has been discussing a revenue sharing agreement between regional churches for nationwide support based on percentages of revenue. MCM aims to support MC Canada with 30% of congregational giving. For 2021, it will be 25%. MC Canada has been having surpluses and have been looking to give back to regional churches (also part of revenue sharing agreement). As a staff and board, this will be monitored.
- Motion from the Board: That the 2020 Financial Report be approved as presented.
- Motion carried.
- Motion from the Board: That the 2021 MCM Budget and Camps Projections be approved as presented.

This covenant creates a close working relationship among the regions, and helps us to support our congregations more effectively, living into our conviction that the congregation is the primary locus of the church's life and ministry.

Joint Council

Mennonite Church Canada is governed by a Joint Council. Each region has two members on the Council: the regional moderator and one member-at-large. The Executive Minister of Mennonite Church Canada, the national moderator, the vice-moderator, and the secretary/treasurer make up the balance of the Council. The Executive Ministers Group advises Joint Council, which meets 3-4 times per year.

Executive Staff Group (ESG)

The ESG is comprised of all the Executive Ministers: five regional and one national. This is a critical working group in our nationwide church which meets at least monthly for collaboration and to advise the Mennonite Church Canada Executive Minister.

Other nationwide groups meeting regularly:

- · Finance, Policy, and Audit Committee: the secretary/treasurer and other appointees
- Sustainability Leadership Group: representatives from Joint Council and ESG plus regional reps, focused on environmental sustainability for Mennonite Church Canada
- Church Leadership Ministers: regional Leadership Ministers plus the Executive Minister
- · Communicators: regional communicators plus the nationwide Communications Coordinator

Nationwide Gatherings

- Every Regional Church gathering includes nationwide agenda
- Mennonite Church Canada delegates meet annually for business agenda
- Mennonite Church Canada delegates meet biannually (see below) with interested leaders and representatives from all churches to learn, discuss, worship, and build community

Executive Minister's report

"...for I do hope..." (Romans 15:22)

It has been a difficult year.


In 2021, on the world stage, tension and trouble abounded. As Canadians, our hearts sank when we learned of the unmarked graves of hundreds of Indigenous children in Kamloops, and then at Cowessess First Nation in Saskatchewan. More discoveries followed. We experienced another summer of drought and forest fires, followed by disastrous floods clearly attributed to our changing climate. This, with along with global political uprisings, supply chain disruptions, market uncertainties...we have almost grown numb to the struggles that we hear in the daily news.

Discouragement has also been felt in many of our congregations as well. As of mid-January, many congregations across the nationwide church have returned, yet again, to worship via recorded video and livestreaming. Hopes for in-person Sunday School, kids' clubs, adult bible studies, pastoral visits and potlucks have once again been postponed.

We had envisioned that, by now, congregations and regions would be sharing together the new ways they have found to be the church, as we emerged from the pandemic. However, we continue to tune into what public health officials recommend so we can limit risk to the most vulnerable among us.

I am reminded of the Apostle Paul whose plans to visit the Christians in Rome (Romans 15:22ff) were repeatedly delayed. Then, in due time, he was able to travel and minister again. Like Paul, the delay doesn't mean that we have stopped hoping and dreaming! I'm so thankful to those who have volunteered to be part of the Community of Spiritual Leadership and the Intercultural Church Steering Committee, new groups that will provide leadership and discernment for our nationwide community of faith in the coming years.

Our Sustainability Leadership Group (SLG) worked with students from The King's University in Edmonton who



produced a resource to help our congregations take steps to become more sustainable communities.

One of the blessings of pandemic restrictions has been that Mennonite Church Canada executive has had time to clarify nationwide church governance structure and ministry priorities. We

have engaged with MC USA to update our ministerial misconduct policy and we are currently expanding the mandate of the SLG to anchor a nationwide climate-action response.

As you will read in the following reports, our program directors have also adapted their activities to continue to resource congregations across the nationwide church and to grow our engagement with our international partners and Indigenous neighbours.

Sincere and heartfelt thanks to all of you for your generous support of the nationwide church. We are so blessed to be the recipients of your financial contributions and your gifts of time, talents and abilities.



We trust that God will grow strong ministries and witness in 2022.

Indigenous-Settler Relations

In 2021, Canadians were forced to reckon with genocide, the government finally affirmed Indigenous human rights in law and Indigenous land defenders – in multiple places – stood their ground to resist climate catastrophe. Through these events – both heartrending and regenerative – churches like ours could hear the call of Creator and found ways to respond.

Unmarked graves

On May 27, 2021, news broke that shocked the country– <u>215 unmarked graves</u> found on the grounds of the Kamloops Indian Residential School. In the weeks to come, hundreds, then thousands more graves were identified in other locations across Canada. So many Indigenous children buried on schoolyards, some as young as three years old.

In 2015, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Final Report contained an <u>entire volume</u> on the reality of missing children and umarked burials. Not many took notice. But now, through multiple "discoveries," a floodlight was shone on this violent piece of Canada's history – one that moved the <u>Canadian Historial</u> <u>Association</u> to declare that the Canada's treatment of Indigenous peoples warrants the use of the word "genocide."

Be it Resolved Challenge

In June, more than one hundred people joined Mennonite

Church Canada's <u>Be it</u> <u>Resolved Challenge</u> a group that committed itself to: 1) remembering the commitments that Mennonites have made to Indigenous justice over the past 50 years and 2) making a personal pledge to live out specific "calls to action."

Recognition of Indigenous rights

For decades, Indigenous activists and their allies have been trying to get Canada to embrace the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples in law. Mennonite Church Canada joined the effort in 2016. On June 21,

2021 – Indigenous Peoples Day – <u>Bill C-15</u>, An Act respecting the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, achieved Royal Assent.

Implementation will take time, but C-15 should bring us closer to the Declaration's vision of "harmonious and cooperative relations" rooted in justice and respect.

#LandBack

As Canadians wrestled with the violence of colonialism past, as government embraced the possibility of a postcolonial future, many Indigenous peoples in the present were out on their lands and waters, risking their lives to protect their territories from resource development that lacks consent. From the east coast fisheries of the Mi'kmaq to the Haudenosaunee-led "1492 Land Back Lane"; from the "Tiny House Warriors" in Secwepemc territory to the Unist'ot'en and Gidim'ten water protectors



in Wet'suwet'en; frontline, land back movements are growing in frequency due to the increasing threat of global warming. Mennonite Church Canada, in partnership

with regional church working groups and <u>Christian</u> <u>Peacemaker Teams</u> supported two of these resistance movements. We brought weekly meals and supplies, wrote solidarity <u>statements</u> and hosted awareness-raising <u>webinars</u>. We sent teams out <u>to the land</u>, to be with, learn from and support Indigenous land defenders in their divine vocation of protecting creation.



The work isn't easy. But it is important, necessary and often joyful. Together!

International Witness

Through prayer and online conversations, International Witness has traveled the world this year. Mennonite Church British Colombia organized a Road Trip visiting three countries in June. Witness Support Networks connected with Witness workers and local partners on regular Zoom calls. Witness workers, in live and recorded messages, spoke in churches across Canada while in their countries of service.

Highlights from 2021:

- We prayed for an end to violence and for peace to reign, together with siblings in faith <u>in Myanmar</u>, <u>Colombia</u> and Ethiopia.
- In July, IW hosted <u>an online conversation</u> with the Colombian Mennonite Church (IMCOL) to share our churches' responses to the discovery of unmarked graves at former Indian residential school sites in Canada and to ongoing violence against civilians in Colombia. Forming congregation-to-congregation partnerships with us is a priority for IMCOL.
- In October, we went on <u>a virtual tour</u> of Bethlehem Bible College with faculty and students who shared about life in Bethlehem.
- Witness workers George and Tobia Veith returned to



Canada in the fall, <u>ending</u> <u>30 years of service</u> in the greater China area. They spoke in churches from October (2021) to January (2022) sharing how they witnessed God at work. • Thirteen of the 37 peace

and reconciliation (PAR) teams trained by Witness workers <u>Lakan Sumulong and Lakambini Mapayapa</u> (Dann and Joji Pantoja) in the Philippines have asked for sustainable-agriculture training with Coffee for Peace. Several Indigenous people groups in Mindanao also invited PeaceBuilders Community Inc. and Coffee for Peace to work with them on sustainableagriculture and inclusive development training. Other PAR teams are focused on community service and peacebuilding.

 Chuncheon Community Peace Center in South Korea, founded by Witness worker Bock Ki Kim, is now financially independent and pays its trainees, who are invited to work in local schools, with the police service and other community groups. Training



happened twice this year to increase facilitators of the restorative justice circle because of high demand.

- Worshipping groups in China are breaking off into smaller groups to avoid criticism from authorities. They are finding creative ways to share resources. This means an even bigger need for the leadership development and training Mennonite Church Canada is supporting.
- Leaders of four Mennonite Peace Houses, small house church gatherings, are mentored by Witness workers Tom and Christine Poovong in Thailand. They are part of Friends of Grace Church Association, where 43 congregations share resources for leadership development, outreach and income generation. Due to COVID-19, these leaders meet online every week. They are now developing an eight-month online training course.
- Meserete Kristos Seminary in Ethiopia has invited <u>Werner and Joanne De</u> <u>Jong (MCA)</u> to teach and support faculty development. After a lengthy delay due to visa issues, the De Jongs left for Ethiopia in mid-January (2022).



The MENNONITE CHURCH BRITISH COLUMBIA (MCBC) Story to the Nationwide Regional Churches for 2021, Submitted by Garry Janzen, Executive Minister

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. Romans 15:13

As we reflect on this past year, it has brought many more challenges. We spoke of 2020 being a year like none other with all the uncertainties brought to us by COVID-19. With many of the ravages of climate change landing in BC, including a heat dome, atmospheric rivers, and the destructive effects of fire and flooding, we are moved to look for what might give us hope. Romans 15 reminds us of where our hope comes from, ending with the benediction in verse 13 above. May this hope that we find in Jesus sustain us and carry us as our theme in 2022.

In 2021 we affirmed a new structure for MCBC. Task Groups have grown, and others have been formed. There is much that our people have said they care about and want to act on, and the work of our task groups reflect these interests. Our task groups are too numerous to name them all here. We give thanks to our Ministry Leaders: Andrew Haak (Cultivating Anabaptist Vision), Henry Krause (Engaging God's World) and Bob Boehr (Growing Community). They do quarterly reports on the work in their ministry area. As Leadership Board members they also help with giving overall direction to MCBC.

We have said that the local congregation is the foundational unit of the church. It has been brought to our attention that we still need to figure out how our MCBC task groups connect with this commitment. It might be good for those who are in task groups to let their congregations know what they are doing, and for congregational leadership to become familiar with the task groups that their people have joined and learn about their work.

MCBC has developed an Indigenous Land Acknowledgement statement. Here it is, "We respectfully and gratefully acknowledge that we gather on the unceded, traditional, and ancestral lands of Indigenous First Nations." It is designed to be general for use anywhere in the province, brief, and adaptable to the specific Indigenous lands on which any MCBC event may be taking place.

In September I announced my plans to retire mid-2022. The exact time will be dependent on when a new Executive Minister is found. There is hope that I might have overlap with the new person for some orientation. I am in my 15th year, and I am so thankful for this rich experience.

The 2022 MCBC Annual Gathering on February 26th will be on Zoom. Video reports will be posted in advance.

This fall it became possible to meet in person again for worship services. This gave opportunity to catch up with baptisms, pastoral installations, licensing, and ordination. It was a great pleasure to be able to do these celebrations, but with the continuing uncertainties regarding COVID, preparation was challenging. We learned to do a no-touch laying on of hands.

Appreciation needs to be given to the Calling & Credentialling Task Group for the many Zoom interviews they did and other hard work they were called to do virtually this year. Also, the Intercultural Church Task Group has been meeting with our non-English pastors and others interested in MCBC congregations becoming intercultural, thanks to the work of Joon Park. This is a very positive and hopeful initiative.

As 2022 unfolds, hopefully this will be the year to move beyond COVID-19 as a pandemic. Our Nationwide work together as the Mennonite Church gives me hope. May we be filled with hope in whatever circumstances we find ourselves, and may we find our way to amazing new beginnings as we serve together in God's work.


Nurturing One Another

Mennonite Church Saskatchewan 2021 Annual Report

Mennonite Church Saskatchewan (MC Sask) is a community of 23 congregations who have covenanted together to be Christ Centred & Sent. We support each other in ministry, do things together which we cannot do alone, are church together throughout the province, and connect to the larger Mennonite Church body through Mennonite Church Canada and Mennonite World Conference.



At the 2021 Annual Delegate Sessions, held via Zoom on March 13, we focused on being 'Called to Hear,' particularly from one another. We were richly blessed to hear from Hanley, Superb, and Zoar Mennonite Churches about their closures. The legacy and ministry of these communities has widely blessed the Mennonite Church over the years, and hearing their testimonies was a powerful reminder of the importance of our living into our calling as the Church to both 'hear' and 'here' (our ADS 2022 theme).

Congregational Transitions

This calling to hear/here was lived into further through a variety of transitions during the year. Barb and Wilmer Froese completed their term as Interim Pastors at Tiefengrund Rosenort MC on Dec. 31, 2020. Patrick Preheim began serving part-time at TRMC in April. On April 4, Gary Peters retired as pastor of Hanley MC, and this Sunday also marked the final worship service at Hanley MC. Harry Harder retired from Pleasant Point MC on May 15, and Pleasant Point and Warman MC's welcomed Len Rempel in June, with a joint installation service held on Oct. 24. On May 31 Andrea Enns-Gooding completed her term as pastor at Zoar MC, which was also the final worship service for Zoar MC. Andrea began her time as pastor for Rosthern MC on July 1 and was installed on Sept. 12. On Sept. 30 Sarah Unrau resigned as Youth Leader of Nutana Park MC. We were also blessed to have two pastors respond to their calling to serve the wider church through ordination services: Susanne Guenther Loewen (Nutana Park MC, June 27), and Emily Summach (Langham MF, Nov. 21)

The Work of the Church

Throughout 2021, we continued to find ways to navigate in-person and online events, and search for ways to meaningfully – and safely – bring our community together and engage in the work of the Church. Online **Mega Menno** game nights became a regular way for youth to connect, and the fun continued when outdoor events at Shekinah and the Youth Farm became possible. Spending time listening to, and resourcing, pastors and congregations was an important part of this year, with pastor's gatherings and shared online services providing meaningful moments of connection. A new workshop, **Reimagine**, is now available to help congregations think about new ways to respond to the call to be the Church. In 2022 we look forward to gathering in Alberta for MC Canada gatherings 'We Declare' and 'Amplify!' (youth) to connect with our brothers and sisters once again from across MC Canada in fellowship and worship.

As we look to the year ahead, we invite your prayers as we prepare for **Kirsten Hamm-Epp** to be away on maternity leave (beginning Jan. 31, 2022), and to say farewell to **Ryan Siemens**, who is resigning his role as Executive Minister as of Jan. 31, 2022, to take on the role of Executive Director with Mennonite Central Committee Alberta. Ryan has contributed significantly to the MC Sask community, and his vision, heart for the Church, and laugh will be greatly missed. We are pleased to announcement the hiring of **Josh Wallace** as Interim Executive Minister. So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand. Isaiah 41:10

As we reflect back on a turbulent year in our Mission of providing compassionate, outstanding long-term care and affordable housing to seniors we affirm that God's grace has been and is sufficient to the task before us. The dominant theme for our organization, as we learnt to navigate the Covid-19 storm that hit many Long Term Care facilities hard, was to trust in God's unfailing grace to keep our residents safe and thriving.

The atmosphere in our facilities was often intense, with rapidly changing public health orders and restriction to protect the most vulnerable of our population. We are grateful for God's hand of protection, when a total of 33 residents in our PCHs were diagnosed, of which 12 died of Covid-19 related complications. At the height of the outbreak, we had 14 residents that required around the clock staff resources for adequate care. A number of creative adjustments needed to be made very quickly to ensure the basic needs of residents could be met in our facilities. The Bethania Chapel and Park area were converted into an isolation room for residents with Covid-19. Moving residents to this special care area as soon as test results were known, shutting down Units, and trying to limit Resident to Resident contact were key factors in limiting the transmission of the virus to other units. In hindsight, it seems appropriate that our Chapel became a true sanctuary for those residents whose lives were most at risk during this critical time. We are grateful for the Nurses, Health Care Aides and our Chaplains for their courage and dedication to our Residents' care. January 20, 2021 was a day of great rejoicing for Residents, families and staff, when the last three Residents came out of the Covid Care and Recovery Room, and the outbreak was declared over.

In the following months, our Nursing Leadership Team and Directors worked diligently at researching and implementing best practices to prevent further infections. Daily conference calls with Public Health Officials, WRHA, Infection Control and Prevention officers, the Vaccine Implementation Taskforce, Manitoba Health and Shared Health proved to be essential in providing direction and guidance for offering safe and effective service to our PCH Residents and Seniors Homes Tenants, as well as for our staff. The sheer volume of information was often overwhelming.

One of the most difficult requirements was the need to close our doors to outside visitors, especially family members, who are such an important part of the emotional, mental and spiritual wellbeing of the elderly. Keeping families informed and connected safely to their loved ones remained uppermost on our minds. Families were kept informed of any changes in the health status of Residents, and end of life visits for families were facilitated. Spiritual care and support was offered to Residents, families and staff who were also grieving these losses.

From March 2020 to July 2021 there were long periods where all in-facility visits were suspended, and even our Indoor/Outdoor visiting was on hold during our Code Red shut down. While FaceTime and Google Duo visits provided a measure of connection between Residents and their Family members, we saw and felt the deep impact of the sadness and loneliness in the faces of our Residents. Our Health Care, Recreation and Spiritual Care staff worked diligently to comfort and reassure Residents during lock downs, and supported them on a one to one basis. As group programming for Recreation and Spiritual Care was suspended, our staff looked for innovative opportunities to facilitate viewing of Church services on CCTV on the Units, reading correspondence from family for the Residents, assisting in virtual visits, and one to one activities to prevent social isolation and loneliness.

Following the death of Residents we often heard the lament from families that they were not able to have a proper Funeral service due to Covid-19 restrictions. While we were not able to invite family members for in-person Memorial Services for those Residents who had died, we offered numerous Virtual Memorial Services via ZOOM that were received with great appreciation.

Throughout these trying times, we have strongly felt the continued support of family members and our faith communities who expressed their genuine concern for our Leadership Team, our Board of Directors, and our dedicated Staff. Encouragement was expressed through gift cards for staff meals, email messages of support and appreciation, prayers, financial gifts to the Memorial Foundation and many other expressions of caring.

As we look toward 2022, we anticipate that Covid-19 is likely to stay in circulation for some time to come. We endeavor to resist letting the negative impacts of this pandemic overwhelm us. Rather, we pledge to move forward with confident imagination of God's work among us, as we continue to care for our elderly.



Inter- Mennonite Chaplaincy Assoc.

Inter-Mennonite Chaplaincy Association (IMCA) is a partnership of three Mennonite conferences (MCM, EMMC and EMC) which provides an Anabaptist presence and chaplain for students, faculty and staff at the University of Manitoba Fort Garry campus. I have had the privilege of serving as the IMCA chaplain since 2003.

For decades, the IMCA ministry was based in a space on the lower level of the University Centre referred to by students as the "Menno Office". There, students from many backgrounds gathered together in person to find support and encouragement through meaningful friendships and conversations as well as opportunities for worship and discussions that explore the intersection of faith and life.

In March of 2020, with the loss of our meeting space due to fire damage and with COVID restrictions preventing students from gathering on campus, IMCA adapted its ministry quickly and creatively to an online format.

For the past two years we have continued to engage with and create opportunities for students to connect using various online formats. "Discord" has served as the primary on-line platform to host the "E-Menno Office". Last spring, students put together a video in which they invited new students to come and join them in the "E-Menno Office". We are grateful for the technology that has enabled us to maintain a vital and vibrant ministry, including weekly topical "Menno Talk" discussions. With the return of a limited number of students to campus last fall we had the opportunity for some in person "Popup Menno Office" visits with individuals or small groups on campus. I also met in person with students off campus and maintained contact with students, faculty and staff through email, text messaging and phone calls.

With the majority of students still learning remotely last term, we assembled "Body, mind and spirit care packages" for students as a tangible expression of love and support. These were distributed in November and December before the latest restrictions.

As part of the University of Manitoba Spiritual Care Team, I have continued to connect with colleagues from other faith groups that serve the university community. I am excited to report that work is in progress to create a new space for the Chaplaincy and Spiritual Care offices in the University Centre. This will include a physical space for the Menno Office. It is estimated to be ready for occupancy this spring.

As we wait in anticipation for new space and for a lifting of restrictions that will allow students to return to campus, we remain ever grateful for your prayers and ongoing partnership as we continue to respond faithfully and creatively to the challenges and opportunities before us.

MCC Manitoba 2021 | Report to MCM Gathering

We live in extraordinary times. This could arguably be said of almost any year, but as we approach the two-year anniversary of the pandemic, it feels especially poignant.

In 2021, each of us adjusted, scaled, and reworked our plans to accommodate the changing public health landscape. And while at MCC it was no different, we sought out ways to continue ministries with churches and volunteers, through local partnerships around the world and local programs in Manitoba.

We found new ways to connect locally with congregations, schools and communities using online platforms to share sermons, presentations, and coordinate events.

With your support, youth were given opportunities to develop employment skills at Sam's Place, refugee families were welcomed to Manitoba, webinars and workshops equipped local communities to respond to domestic violence, and collaboration with local partners continued in efforts to learn from and reconcile with Indigenous neighbours. We also celebrated the launch of *Germinating Conversations: Food, Faith, Farming and the Land*, offering a peacebuilding process for difficult conversations of all kinds.

In trying times, we are especially humbled by dedicated volunteers and staff in Thrift and Material Resources. Thrift shops have continued faithful support of MCC throughout the year, despite shared and unique pandemic-related challenges in each shop's context. In Material Resources, we held a successful online quilt sale and participated in the launch of MCC's new dignity kit.

On a global scale, MCC continued relief, development and peace work in more than 45 countries. Relief highlights include overwhelming responses to the Haiti earthquake and humanitarian crisis in the Tigray region of Ethiopia. We were able to respond swiftly in Haiti, relying on long-term relationships with local partners to assess the greatest needs and reach vulnerable people in remote communities safely. In Ethiopia, we worked with the local church to get food assistance to Tigray before the region was closed off to aid. Development continued through food, livelihoods, water, health and education projects. In places like Democratic Republic of Congo, we're providing rainwater catchment systems and latrines to prevent the spread of infectious diseases.

We continue to weave peacebuilding into all that we do. Like in Colombia, where our local church partner upholds a strong peace witness by maintaining autonomy from both government agencies and armed groups, offering agricultural trainings and purchasing crops from farmers in the Chocó region — where conflict, armed groups and illicit activities are daily obstacles to community wellbeing.

As we reflect, we recognize that, despite a turbulent year, you have continued to faithfully partner with and support MCC, and together our mission—to share God's love and compassion for all in the name of Christ—continues. Thanks be to God!

As 2022 begins, we pray that you will join us in hope and rest in the words of Jesus in John 15:4-5:

Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing.

MDS Canada 2021: Faith in Action, Caring Relationships

"It was nothing short of a miracle. It never would have happened without MDS. It's just so unreal. I don't know how to thank MDS. It's amazing how people we don't know came to help us. It's God sent, that's all I know."

That's what Diane Rice of Triton, Newfoundland said after MDS Canada, together with local volunteers in that community, rebuilt her home that was destroyed by fire.

Her comment reminds me of why MDS Canada exists—volunteers who are sent by God to be the hands and feet of Jesus when people are hurting and need help.

Although 2021 was a hard year for us-the pandemic curtailed most of our responses in this country and prevented Canadians from going to the U.S. to volunteer-

it couldn't stop us from doing what we could to help people impacted by disasters. Despite the pandemic, and the restrictions it imposed, we still responded to people in need.

In Ontario, we worked with MCC to promote reconciliation with Indigenous people by providing volunteers to renovate the MCC Indigenous Neighbours office in Timmins. We also worked with MennoHomes, an organization that provides affordable housing in Kitchener, to renovate a

derelict house into a home for a Syrian refugee family. In Barry's Bay we were able to renovate a house to accommodate a family with a disabled child, creating a safe, sterile, and temperature-controlled space.

In B.C., we learned you can be off the grid but not out of God's plan when it comes to rebuilding a house. That's what happened after a fire destroyed the home of Cliff and Lydia Trudeau at Cuisson Lake. Rebuilding their house was challenging, since they live in a remote part of the province. With some creative thinking on the part of volunteers, along with energetic ingenuity and lots of prayer, the house was completed in August.



Also in B.C., volunteers responded to needs in Princeton, where about 300 families had their homes damaged or destroyed by flooding.

In Saskatchewan, we renovated the office and home of the director at the Westbank Bible Camp. Said the director about the volunteers: "They showed up with a servant attitude and posture, always asking what they could do for us, how they could serve us," he said. "It was phenomenal. They had such servant hearts."

Also in Saskatchewan, weather was the big story this year. Drought affected farmers in the province, hitting livestock farmers the hardest. Many don't have enough hay for their animals in winter. Together with the MDS

Ontario Unit, we created MDS Hay West, a way for farmers in Ontario-who enjoyed good growing weather-to send donated hay to Saskatchewan. Best of all, it was a way for farmers in Ontario to say thanks. It was nine years ago that farmers in Saskatchewan sent Hay East to them when drought was bad in that province.

In Newfoundland, MDS Canada supplied the funds and local people in Triton provided the volunteers to build a new

house for Diane and Reginald Rice after fire destroyed their home.

Across Canada, we responded through the Spirit of MDS Fund. Through the fund, we provided 81 grants worth \$206,900 to churches involved in frontline service to people impacted by the pandemic.

At MDS in Canada our goal is to use our core values of faith in action and caring relationships to be a witness to God's love for the world. We invite you to consider volunteering with us and joining us in praying for God's continued blessing on our work.

Dear Mennonite Church Manitoba delegates,

As a "related" organization, it is our pleasure to partner with you all as individuals and congregations to train the next generation to hear God's call. Westgate Mennonite Collegiate is a Christian School grounded in the Anabaptist tradition. It is the mission of the school to



provide a well-rounded education, which will inspire and empower students to live as people of God.

The school has 310 students enrolled, with one class of Grade 6, three classes of Grade 9, and two classes of Grades 7, 8, 10, 11 and 12. Our enrolment campaign is in full swing and families of our supporting churches are invited to consider Westgate for the 2022-2023 academic year.

In-class instruction was interrupted intermittently last year as the province moved some schools, including ours, to periods of remote learning. Our band and choral programs were hampered by restrictions, all intra-school athletics were suspended, and our dramas and concerts could be performed only virtually. However, school appears more typical this year. Singing and playing wind instruments are permissible, albeit with masks and horn covers in use. Our volleyball teams enjoyed terrific results, with our small school winning the Varsity Boys AAAA Volleyball Championships. Early plans for a school musical are in the works. God willing, we hope that we will be able to resume our camping trips for students after June exams, and we hope to hold graduation June 28, 2022.

Nurturing Faith

Our chapel theme this year is "New Beginnings", anchored by Isaiah 43:19, where God says... See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.

We know coming out of the pandemic that the reign of God continues. God will do a new thing! We are invited to perceive it, to see it and to walk with God and one another in the ways of life, hope and perseverance. We trust this is the message we can help guide our community to hear, embrace and live this school year.



We are grateful to God for the unique opportunity we have to serve both the Mennonite Churches in Winnipeg and many other families who choose to attend Westgate. About 40% of the families are members from our churches. One quarter of the student body comes from various other denominations and many others from no faith community. It is a serious responsibility and a privilege to introduce these students to the call of discipleship and the love of God.

We request your prayer and student support of this important church work for our youth. We see ourselves as an extension of the churches and desire to work together to train our youth.
